## **Federal Updates**

Final Public Charge Rule Published

The Department of Homeland Security's <u>final public charge rule</u> has been posted to the Federal Register for inspection, with official publication scheduled for Wednesday, August 14th. If litigation does not prevent the rule from taking effect, the policy will become effective in 60 days on October 15th. The rule sets new standards for obtaining permanent residency and U.S. citizenship in order to limit immigration from those who might participate in taxpayer-funded benefits. ## State Updates

#### **Gov. Pritzker Expanding Apprenticeship Programs**

On August 2, 2019, Governor Pritzker signed a bill into law that offers a tax credit to businesses that bring in qualified apprentices. The measure would allow companies to apply for tax credits on up to \$3,500 spent on books, tuition and lab fees per apprentice. This measure follows Pritzker's signing of an executive order in January 2019 to strengthen the state's commitment to job creation and workforce development, including expanding apprenticeship programs already in place and developing new ones. # **Youth Opportunities**

#### **United States Senate Youth Program**

The <u>United States Senate Youth Program</u> (USSYP) is a scholarship program for high school juniors and seniors. The scholarship sends two eligible students from each state for an all-expenses-paid week in Washington, D.C., (March 7-14, 2020). While in Washington, they hear policy addresses, meet with senators, Cabinet members, and officials of the Departments of State and Defense. Delegates also traditionally participate in a meeting with a justice of the U.S. Supreme Court and the president of the United States. Upon successful completion of Washington Week, finalists are provided a \$10,000 scholarship. The deadline to apply is **October 1st**.

#### **Lesbians Who Tech Scholarships**

<u>Lesbians Who Tech</u> is committed to convening queer women and non-binary people in technology (and allies) in a vibrant and inclusive community. They promote the visibility and inclusion of women, LGBTQIA+ people, and people from other backgrounds underrepresented in technology. Lesbians Who Tech is offering <u>coding scholarships</u> that cover up to 50% of tuition and connect students to networks of mentors that will support them during their studies.
