# What is Advocacy?

Advocacy is an action taken to support a cause or proposal. ACT Now views advocacy as the act of sharing perspectives and personal experiences to highlight the importance of afterschool and community schools programming with diverse stakeholders.

# Why is Advocacy Important?

ACT Now sees advocacy as a key strategy for educating change-makers and providing partners with the context needed to develop supportive policies. Out-of-School Time (OST) advocates may contribute by highlighting success stories within their programs and sharing their organization's plans and ideas with policymakers to gain support for their work.

Afterschool programs and community school providers actively serve the academic, social, and health needs of youth and families. Currently in Illinois, more than 1 million children would join afterschool program if one were available to them. The demand for high-quality programs is far greater than the availability of services for students in Illinois and current funding levels cannot address the increased need.

Afterschool providers and community schools are vital to youth's growth and safety, offering learning renewal opportunities, meals, and wraparound services. Programs collaborate with school districts and state agencies to leverage resources and provide youth development programming to all youth, especially in historically marginalized communities of color.

Advocacy efforts are critical to ensuring that policymakers understand the realities of youth and the communities your program supports. Advocacy campaigns support program providers in highlighting the challenges in facilitating these integral services and informing decision-makers of their actions! As a result, policymakers should be aware of the need and encouraged to prioritize funding for afterschool programs and community schools.

## How Can I Advocate?

Many afterschool programs operate in a hybrid world, and so do elected officials! As a result, ACT Now encourages program providers to host both in-person site visits and virtual meetings with elected officials. Additional engagement with policymakers can be done through mailing letters, sending emails, calling offices, and utilizing posts and videos on social media.

## **Advocacy Tips and Best Practices**

Be Nonpartisan

Share some key points about the situation without using an argumentative tone. This will keep the lines of communication open for discussion of future issues.

Know the Issue

Make sure you speak to the importance of afterschool and its impact on communities. <u>The Afterschool Alliance</u> is a great resource for finding data on the need for afterschool programs!

Know Your Lawmakers

Read about your legislators, their committee(s), and their interests so you can tailor your message accordingly. Many elected officials have worked in the youth development space!

Stay Focused

Focus your communications with your legislator on one topic. Make sure to use separate conversations for different issues and advocacy campaigns.

Learn the Legislative Process

In order to become a successful advocate, you need to know the basics of the legislative process. This means knowing who to go to for your particular advocacy ask.

Be Honest

It is okay to not know the answer to a question in the moment. Acknowledge it, and follow-up with the correct information later!

Send a
Thank You!

Follow-up with an email, letter or social media post thanking your member of Congress or their staff for meeting with you. This will help to foster a great relationship going forward!

# How Can I Engage Youth in Advocacy?

Engaging youth in advocacy amplifies their voices, empowers them to impact communities, and ensures others understand their experiences. Collaboration between youth and adults can address major challenges in afterschool programs and present solutions to overcome those challenges.

Working with youth requires intentionality and open-mindedness. Youth-adult partnerships recognize and value youth's opinions and ideas. Below are some tips for involving youth in advocacy efforts.

## **Tips**



Help youth identify exactly what they want to advocate for. Set attainable goals.



Use aspects of a safe space such as using appropriate language, being nonjudgemental, accepting, and reassuring young people that their voices are important.



Empower youth with leadership roles to build lifelong skills.

## Who Are My Elected Officials?

#### Identifying Your Elected Officials

The Illinois State Board of Elections has a District and Official Search page where you can find your elected state officials and federal representative. The two senators currently representing Illinois are <u>Dick Durbin</u> and <u>Tammy</u> <u>Duckworth</u>. To access this website, click <u>here</u>.



Please Note: You must enter a complete address with a corresponding zip code (e.g.: 101 N Wacker Drive, Chicago, IL 60606, Cook County) for the map to locate your legislators' information. Otherwise, you may enter the county in which you pertain (e.g.: Macon County, Macon County) in to find your elected officials.

## Background Information on Your Elected Officials

It is helpful to understand what policies or bills your elected officials may have supported in the past and if they have previously championed afterschool programs in their legislation. For policymakers that are not as familiar with afterschool, community schools, and summer learning programs, <u>NOW</u> is the opportunity to highlight the work your program facilitates for youth and families.

The Illinois General Assembly's website has information on your state elected officials. To access this website, click <u>here</u>. More information may be found by visiting your state policymaker's personal website.



## Letters & Emails to Elected Officials

One of the most effective methods of interacting with your elected officials is sending written or email communications.

## **Elements of an Effective Letter**

#### Targeted & Focused

You should address letters to the appropriate legislators in the district where you live and/or where your organization is located.

#### Individualized

If you use a form letter, be sure to edit or modify it to deliver a unique message. Personal messages are more likely to influence legislators.

#### **Brief**

In one to two pages, explain the issue you are responding to and the impact of the proposed resolution or legislation.

#### Non-Partisan

There is a higher chance of receiving a response to your advocacy if the message does not center on partisanship.

#### **Opening Statement**

- State the subject of your letter
- Use the bill number or budget line name, if available
- Identify yourself and your organization

#### **Body Paragraph**

- Explain the issue clearly at a level your legislator will understand. They are not experts!
- Give a personal example of the impact of the issue.
- State your position on the bill or policy where appropriate.

#### **Closing Statement**

- Thank the elected official for their attention to the issue.
- Let your legislator know that you are a credible contact in the case they want more information.
- Ask for a reply!



## Sample Letter/Email

## Phone Calls to Elected Officials

#### **How to Call Elected Officials**

#### Research Your Legislator

Learn their position on afterschool before calling.

#### Prepare for the Call

Develop a concise list of talking points you want to share during the call. Design the points to highlight the main issue, your work, and the youth you serve. Incorporate the impact/outcome data from your program.

#### Introduce Yourself

State your name and identify yourself as a constituent of the district the elected official represents. Provide your address and telephone number if the legislative aide requests it. If you are calling about a specific piece of legislation, identify it by its name and bill number. If you are calling on behalf of a program, remember to note the name and location of the program.

#### **Show Appreciation**

If your legislator has supported your cause in the past, let them know you appreciated it. Add that you are hoping they will continue to support the issue.

## Focus on a Single Issue & State Your Position

Briefly explain your position and what actions you would like your legislator to take.

#### Thank the Legislator

Remember always to be courteous and respectful. If speaking to a legislative aide, write down their name and contact information.

#### Follow-Up

If the aide requests additional information, try to provide it as soon as possible. Keep track of your legislator's actions and follow up with a letter expressing thanks for connecting.





## Phone Calls to Elected Officials continued...

#### State Legislators

As a constituent, you can call your legislator at either their district office or, during the legislative session at their Capitol Building office in Springfield. To reach your legislators in Springfield, you may call the switchboard at *217-782-2000*. You can also find the numbers listed for the Illinois <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u>. Oftentimes, you will speak to a legislative aide rather than your elected official, but rest assured that everyone takes your input seriously and the message will be shared with the policymaker.

#### Federal Legislators

The <u>Clerk of the House</u> maintains the addresses and phone numbers of all of the U.S. House members and Committees, or you may call *(202) 224-3121* for the U.S. House switchboard operator. Additionally, you may choose to visit your member's website directly for further information. To reach your U.S. senators you may phone the United States Capitol switchboard at *(202) 224-3121*. A switchboard operator will connect you directly with the Senate office you request.

## Sample Phone Call

**Staff Member:** Thank you for calling Senator [Last Name] or Representative [Last Name]'s office. How may I help you?

Caller: Hello, my name is [Your Full Name] from [City or Town], and I am calling on behalf of [Name of Afterschool Program or Organization].

Staff Member: Wonderful, what can I do for you?

Don't forget to follow up with the person you spoke with on the phone in an email that summarizes your points and clearly states your ask!

## Using Social Media as a Tool

Social media is a great way to bring awareness to initiatives that matter to you! If you or your organization are not already on social media, the first step is to sign up for a free account on a platform such as Facebook, Instagram, or LinkedIn. Most legislators use these platforms to interact with their constituents and reach more people, specifically youth populations.

To effectively use and leverage social media, think critically about how you can make your content clear, short, compelling, and relevant. It is helpful to experiment with different types of posts. For example, sharing links to videos or blogs and using images and videos to get a better idea of what resonates with your audience. It's all about creating engagement and starting conversations.

The following pages include sample social media posts as well as images to go with each. Feel free to change the messages to fit your programs needs!

## Tips



Be Concise

Keep posts short and to the point. Be clear and articulate the issue and what you think needs to be done about it.



Be Consistent

It is important to post regularly. This keeps followers engaged. Try to post at least once a day, or determine a schedule that works well for your organization.



**Grab Attention** 

Stand out with a memorable ask. Including a photo, video, or graphic can engage more people.



Spread the Word

Make sure your ask is heard by engaging your supporters and encouraging them to help spread the word. Hashtags can be a big help for this!
